

As open houses wrap up, I am excited as we look ahead to meeting families in the upcoming parent/teacher conferences to discuss their child's progress and strengthen our home school bonds.

# Project Bread's School Food Fellowship

We are pleased to announce that the New Bedford School Food and Nutrition department will be participating in Project Bread's School Food Fellowship, a year-long professional development opportunity for school nutrition staff. Project Bread's School Food Fellowship will combine online training for school nutrition directors and select school nutrition staff with in-person site visits and hands-on training. The trainings, designed especially for school nutrition staff by our experienced team of Chef Educators, will cover topics ranging from culinary skill development, customer service, recipe writing, marketing



and promoting meals to kids, to the history of school meals, culturally relevant menu options, and the important role school meals play in combating food insecurity.

Chef Ryan and Chef Sherry will be alternating their in person visits between five of our schools including Roosevelt Middle, Keith Middle, Lincoln Elementary, Carney Elementary, and Campbell Elementary.



Throughout the course of the Fellowship, school nutrition directors and school nutrition staff will have the opportunity to get to know other Fellows in the program, forming a network of school nutrition professionals all working towards the goal of providing the best meals possible to their students. Voices

from the history of New Bedford Public Schools

"Education is not preparation for life. It is life itself, and should continue so long as life shall last."

Allen P. Keith, Superintendent's Report, 1923

In 1908, Allen Phelps Keith (1872-1947) was named superintendent of NBPS, occupying the post for nearly 33 years - the longest tenure since the office was established in 1861. It was a period of rapid growth in the city's population as immigrants came to work in the ever-expanding industrial and textile sectors.

In response, 15 school buildings were constructed during his term, including the High School (now PRAB), two Junior High Schools, two Continuation Schools, two additional schoolhouses and the establishment in 1909 of the Vocational School, then called the Industrial School.

He was intensely interested in children's health, establishing dental, eye, medical and mental clinics, as well as a State clinic for undernourished children. The first school nurses were appointed, a health and hygiene department started, and a continuous progress plan for elementary schools was adopted.

Keith was a strong backer of athletics and the arts, appointing the first PE director. Himself a musician, he played the clarinet in the first

High School Orchestra for a time.


A Bridgewater native, Keith's

boyhood years were spent in Bridgewater and Nashua, where he attended public schools. In 1894, he graduated from the State Normal School at Bridgewater and began his teaching career at Pascoag, Rhode Island. He was appointed superintendent of the Burrillville Public Schools, staying there for 9 years. He then served as superintendent at East Providence, 1904-1906. In 1906, he was appointed principal of the John H. Clifford Grammar School in New Bedford, where he remained

In 1920, the School Committee engaged Dr. Frank E. Spaulding of Yale University to conduct a comprehensive examination of NBPS organization and management. Spaulding's recommendations included the adoption of the Junior High School model - then a national trend. Two Junior High Schools were built one each in the north and south ends of the city.

until his election as super-intendent of schools in 1908.

In 1957, a third junior high school was added for the middle section of the city and named in Keith's honor. In 2000, the city changed to the Middle School model.


